CARERS RIGHTS DAY 2020

Carers' Rights Day, promoted by Carers UK, falls on Thursday 26th November this year with the theme 'Know Your Rights'. Each year the day aims to:

- Ensure carers are aware of their rights
- Ensure carers know where to get help and support
- Raise awareness of the needs of carers.

A survey of nearly 6000 carers was recently held and from that, Carers UK found:

- 4 out of 5 unpaid carers are providing more care for relatives
- 78% reported that the needs of the person they care for have increased during the pandemic
- Two thirds worried about how they will cope through further lockdowns and local restrictions

As a result of the day's activities, Carers UK hopes to empower carers with information and support, giving them the confidence to ask for what they need. They also want to ensure carers know how to challenge when their rights are not met.

Kights For Residents

You will have seen and read much of the extensive coverage in the news about the appalling situation of families not being able to visit their loved ones in care homes. I was alerted by one of my facebook

friends to the campaign, Rights for Residents. The group are asking for a family member to be given 'key worker' status to enable them to be tested and thus safely visit their relatives. They also want better Government guidance to be provided.

Those involved in the campaign are working tirelessly to make this happen but there is frustration at the slow speed of progress. Promising visits 'before Christmas' may be too late for some. Some MPs across the country have been so supportive while the minimal response from others just serves to infuriate the campaigners. Full marks to those in the media who have chosen to put their weight behind the campaign and make a lot of noise.

Of course safety is vital for everyone and there are positive reports from some care homes that really are making visits possible, albeit not in the 'normal' sense. It can be done. Visits are a human right, necessary for the mental health of both resident and family.

I look back at the time my husband was in residential care and am so thankful. I often think 'There but for the grace of God' I needed him as much as he needed me.

TRANSPORT UPDATE

UBUS—dial-a-ride service

The UBUS has been offering an improved service in Stratford District since 26th October.

All towns and parishes in Stratford-on-Avon District will now have

a UBUS operating each day, Monday—Friday. Bookings can be made by calling 01789 264491. Fares are £4 single and £6 return but there is now a Concessionary Pass also available.

This service is available to those unable to make a journey by public transport or who have a mobility impairment. Passengers can travel anywhere within their local area. VASA Community Transport

This service is still running throughout the current lockdown. Safety procedures are reviewed weekly. These include a strict cleaning regime of vehicles before and after each



journey and volunteers are supplied with PPE. Passengers are required to wear a face cover and anyone exempt from wearing one will be referred to another service. Passengers can be taken to medical appointments and to groups or activities which encourage social inclusion.

SCAM ALERT

WCC Trading standards have sent a lengthy alert regarding buying Black Friday and Cyber Monday deals. Because of its length and focus on online shopping, I have uploaded the content to our website and added a "Scam Alerts" tab to the menu. You can find it <u>here</u>.

Additional scams circulating regard:

Individuals selling TVs from the backs of vans in car parks etc. Advice is always to buy from a genuine trader you know and trust.

PPI money back scam. High pressure to make a claim, circumventing 40% commission if a life insurance policy or funeral plan is taken out.

Email Takeover scam: these circulated locally earlier this year and I know of several people affected. A person's account is taken over and the fraudster emails their contacts and asks them to purchase gift cards on behalf of the sender. They then ask for the card numbers and spend your money.
